MY 50TH REUNION MESSAGE HIGHLIGHTS (No, I'm NOT getting old!)

I told my high school classmates in Erlanger, KY how fun it was to speak to a group that actually knew what <u>Matchbox Cars</u> and <u>Banana Seats on Stingray Bikes</u> were.
